This sheet commences from Split Rock S. Pt. and extends to Montauk Point Light House. The character of country from Split Rock to the point is one range of high hills, from twenty to one hundred and eighty feet high. There are five ponds. Viz Fort Pond, Great Pond, Oyster, Little and Big Reed Ponds. This whole section thickly wooded, and is a barren waste, and is only fit for cattle for grazing, on the short stumpy grass.

The outer shore line from Split Rock, to Ditch Plain L. S. S. is composed of fine white sand. About one half mile to the eastward of L. S. S. the shore is protected by high cliffs from twenty to eighty feet high, the pebbles and boulders of this beach serve as a partial protection to the cliffs, during ordinary tides in calm weather, the cliffs is composed of sand & clay with a substratum of boulders, pebbles, gravel and loam.
